Economic Overview

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Demographic Profile

The population in the Bloomingdale village, IL was 22,436 per American Community Survey data for 2017-2021.

The region has a civilian labor force of 12,112 with a participation rate of 66.6%. Of individuals 25 to 64 in the Bloomingdale village, IL, 46.1% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 35.1% in the nation.

The median household income in the Bloomingdale village, IL is \$87,324 and the median house value is \$314,700.



Employment Trends


As of 2023Q2, total employment for the Bloomingdale village, IL was 15,243 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2023Q2, employment increased 2.4% in the region.



Employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2023Q1 with preliminary estimates updated to 2023Q2.

Wage Trends

The average worker in the Bloomingdale village, IL earned annual wages of \$76,609 as of 2023Q2. Average annual wages per worker increased 3.2% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$70,318 in the nation as of 2023Q2.



Annual average wages per worker data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2023Q1 with preliminary estimates updated to 2023Q2.

Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 16.9% higher in Bloomingdale village, IL than the U.S. average.



Industry Snapshot

The largest sector in the Bloomingdale village, IL is Retail Trade, employing 2,547 workers. The next-largest sectors in the region are Accommodation and Food Services (2,291 workers) and Manufacturing (2,236). High location quotients (LQs) indicate sectors in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The sectors with the largest LQs in the region are Wholesale Trade (LQ = 2.10), Manufacturing (1.82), and Accommodation and Food Services (1.74).

Sectors in the Bloomingdale village, IL with the highest average wages per worker are Management of Companies and Enterprises (\$158,981), Finance and Insurance (\$129,970), and Information (\$114,797). Regional sectors with the best job growth (or most moderate job losses) over the last 5 years are Accommodation and Food Services (+139 jobs), Health Care and Social Assistance (+132), and Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (+114).

Over the next 1 year, employment in the Bloomingdale village, IL is projected to contract by 110 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Health Care and Social Assistance with a +0.2% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Health Care and Social Assistance (+4 jobs), Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (+1), and Management of Companies and Enterprises (0).

Occupation Snapshot

The largest major occupation group in the Bloomingdale village, IL is Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations, employing 2,098 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Sales and Related Occupations (1,888 workers) and Transportation and Material Moving Occupations (1,637). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (LQ = 1.71), Production Occupations (1.50), and Sales and Related Occupations (1.39).

Occupation groups in the Bloomingdale village, IL with the highest average wages per worker are Management Occupations (\$140,200), Legal Occupations (\$136,600), and Computer and Mathematical Occupations (\$107,500). The unemployment rate in the region varied among the major groups from 1.4% among Legal Occupations to 5.7% among Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations.

Over the next 1 year, the fastest growing occupation group in the Bloomingdale village, IL is expected to be Healthcare Support Occupations with a +0.8% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Healthcare Support Occupations (+6 jobs) and Computer and Mathematical Occupations (+1). Over the same period, the highest separation demand (occupation demand due to retirements and workers moving from one occupation to another) is expected in Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (379 jobs) and Sales and Related Occupations (253).



Industry Clusters


A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. The industry cluster in the Bloomingdale village, IL with the highest relative concentration is Pharmaceutical with a location quotient of 19.19. This cluster employs 622 workers in the region with an average wage of \$79,299. Employment in the Pharmaceutical cluster is projected to contract in the region about 0.4% per year over the next ten years.



Location quotient and average wage data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, imputed where necessary, and updated through 2023Q1 with preliminary estimates updated to 2023Q2. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth patterns.

Education Levels

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in the Bloomingdale village, IL is projected to contract 0.7% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to contract 0.2% per year, those requiring a bachelor's degree are forecast to contract 0.3% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to contract 0.2% per year.



Employment by occupation data are estimates are as of 2023Q2. Education levels of occupations are based on BLS assignments. Forecast employment growth uses national projections from the Bureau of Labor Statistics adapted for regional growth patterns.

FAQ

What is a location quotient?

A location quotient (LQ) is a measurement of concentration in comparison to the nation. An LQ of 1.00 indicates a region has the same concentration of an industry (or occupation) as the nation. An LQ of 2.00 would mean the region has twice the expected employment compared to the nation and an LQ of 0.50 would mean the region has half the expected employment in comparison to the nation.

What is separation demand?

Separation demand is the number of jobs required due to separations—labor force exits (including retirements) and turnover resulting from workers moving from one occupation into another. Note that separation demand does not include all turnover—it does not include when workers stay in the same occupation but switch employers. The total projected demand for an occupation is the sum of the separation demand and the growth demand (which is the increase or decrease of jobs in an occupation expected due to expansion or contraction of the overall number of jobs in that occupation).

What is a cluster?

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. If a regional cluster has a location quotient of 1.25 or greater, the region is considered to possess a competitive advantage in that cluster.

What is the difference between industry wages and occupation wages?

Industry wages and occupation wages are estimated via separate data sets, often the time periods being reported do not align, and wages are defined slightly differently in the two systems (for example, certain bonuses are included in the industry wages but not the occupation wages). It is therefore common that estimates of the average industry wages and average occupation wages in a region do not match exactly.

What is NAICS?

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is used to classify business establishments according to the type of economic activity. The NAICS Code comprises six levels, from the "all industry" level to the 6-digit level. The first two digits define the top level category, known as the "sector," which is the level examined in this report.

What is SOC?

The Standard Occupational Classification system (SOC) is used to classify workers into occupational categories. All workers are classified into one of over 804 occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, occupations are combined to form 22 major groups, 95 minor groups, and 452 occupation groups. Each occupation group includes detailed occupations requiring similar job duties, skills, education, or experience.
